Sunday 14th April – Knaresborough with Ailsa Burrows

A figure of eight walk along the riverbanks in Knaresborough to look at and discuss up to 15 exposures of the Permian, the Permian/Carboniferous unconformity, depositional environments, westward limit of the Zechstein sea and, if time, a look at the Harrogate anticline. There will also be an overview of the Nidd gorge and its formation. Compass-clinometers might be useful.

This day follows Denys Smith's Memorial trip (Leeds Geolsoc), with additional info provided by Tony Felski.

Good walking boots or even wellies advisable and sticks. Although most of the town and eastern riverbank are on tarmac or good paths the west side is very muddy and slippery; we may not do this side as a consequence. (To be decided on the day following the previous week's weather).

Total distance is 5.5 miles (or possibly 4 miles if we do not do Coyningham Park).

There is a steep climb up to the castle at the start (and down again), which can be missed out if you wish (it gives an overview of the gorge). If we do the west bank there are a few ups and downs, but it is not too strenuous - just tricky underfoot in places.

A packed lunch is advisable so we all eat together, but there is a cafe option - as well as those along the waterfront in town for later. Knaresborough is approximately 50 miles, approx one hour from Huddersfield along the motorways.

Meet at the Waterside car-park, 10:15 for a 10.30 start. Parking cost is £1.80 on Sundays (irrespective of time spent there). Post Code is HG5 8DE. NGR SE 34771 56744. Turn *downhill* at the lights in the town centre - down Gracious Street on the B6163. Just before the river bridge at the bottom of the hill, you will see a sign for the carpark to the right. This is a very narrow lane and you may need to pull in/reverse if you meet traffic coming the other way. The car park is on the left before it narrows even further! You may of course want to park elsewhere/take the train, but this is the meet point. Toilets are just beyond the car park on the right where the road opens out again a bit.

Meet Bill Fraser outside the Mansion House Visitors Centre, LS8 2JL, (SE 330 383) in Roundhay Park. A guided walk of approximately 2.5 miles around a marked

Geological Trail taking about 3 hours, with stops for discussion. Features seen are shales and several different types of sandstone (some of which contain fossils), as well as sedimentary and tectonic structures. Footpaths are graded for easy walking but can be muddy in wet weather.
